THE ROLE OF PHYSICAL THERAPY IN PALLIATIVE CARE AND HOSPICE HOD P06-19-54-22 [Initial: HOD P06-11-14-11] [Previously Titled: The Role of Physical Therapy in Hospice and Palliative Care] [Position]

The American Physical Therapy Association supports an active and compassionate role for physical therapists and physical therapist assistants in palliative care and hospice, consistent with the following concepts:

- Respect for the rights of all individuals to access physical therapist services, regardless of medical prognosis or setting
- An interprofessional approach, including timely physical therapist and physical therapist assistant involvement,
 especially during service transitions or during a physical or medical change in status, to ensure continuity of care
- Education of physical therapists, physical therapist assistants, and respective students in the concepts related to treating an individual while in palliative care and hospice, including nonpharmacological pain management
- Education of patients and clients, families, and interprofessional team members on the unique role and contributions of physical therapists and physical therapist assistants in the management of a patient with a life-threatening illness
- Appropriate and comparable coverage and payment for physical therapist services for individuals who have transitioned to palliative care or hospice in all clinical settings

Explanation of Reference Numbers:
